## Carr Villa Memorial Park

Carr Villa has been Launceston's major cemetery since 1905. The crematorium, crematorium chapel, handling area, incinerator, and initial rose beds and niches were designed and built in 1937-38 and the first cremation was carried out in February 1939.

Burial options at Carr Villa are Lawn Plaque, a peaceful park-like setting; Bronze plaques, placed on a cement beam with a vase supplied at request; Limited Monumental (Lawn) combining lawn and monumental styles; Monuments, erected by monumental masons; Monumental, a more traditional style grave with full monumental work; Woodlawns, a specially designed area for children and babies set apart from the main lawn cemetery. Pre-Purchasing of grave sites and ash placement sites is available through the Carr Villa office.

The cremation options are Barakee Waters, a peaceful garden setting with a meandering stream; Claygrove and Granite Walls, rock walled gardens and pathways which are wheelchair/walking frame friendly; Rose Gardens, over 5,000 roses creating beautiful gardens; Kooyong, gardens filled with natives and Pool of Eternal Memories, a water feature surrounded by gardens of azaleas and conifers. Plaques, a display of plaques are available at our office. Memorial plaque arrangements are by appointment only.


# Safe Winter in Launceston
